Stable Homes, Built on Love

What is Stable Homes, Built on Love?

The 'Stable Homes, Built on Love' strategy is the Government's plan for how to make children's social care work better. The strategy was published on 2nd February 2023 and sets out plans to:

- Address urgent issues facing children and young people
- Lay the foundations for whole system reforms
- Set national direction for change

A National Voice have been running a series of online sessions to talk to as many children in care councils and care leaver forums as possible about different areas of 'Stable Homes, Built on Love' and your ideas for an improved care system.

What we discuss will feed into the work the Department for Education (DfE) are doing to improve things for future children and young people.

We created three workshops, supported by the DfE, which explore different parts of 'Stable Homes, Built on Love'. We put them into an activity pack which was shared with children in care councils and participation groups so they could share their thoughts.

Stable Homes, Built on Love - Activity Pack 1

Activity pack 1 was launched on Thursday 6 July and includes activities on:

The 6 missions for children in care and care leavers Mission 1: Strong and loving relationships by 2027 Extending corporate parenting principles


- Identify as LGBTQ+

- Have experience of mental health issues




We explained that 'Stable Homes, Built on Love' has 6 missions to make care better for children in care and care leavers.

We asked children and young people to rank them in order of priority or to look at the 6 missions and discuss:

- What is good about this?
- What are you worried won't work about this?
- Any questions that you have for the Government about their plans?





For the groups that ranked the missions, mission one was a common theme to be at the top:



This activity opened up a lot of interesting conversations. Some young people struggled with some of the topics. The young people struggled to choose one thing which was the most important to them.

Two groups saw the 6 missions as equally important:





Strong and Loving Relationships: CORAM Voice

The Government want every care-experienced child and young person to feel they have a strong, loving relationship.

Mission 1: By 2027, every care -experienced child and young person will feelthey have strong, loving relationship in place.


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Extending corporate parenting principles

The Government are thinking that this should apply to other bodies and organisations outside your local authority. They state:

Mission 3: By 2027, we will strengthen and extend corporate parenting responsibilities towards children in care and care leavers across the public sector

The Care Review highlighted that, while local authorities play a crucial role in delivering services to children in care and care leavers, other organisations also have an important role to play. The Government know that children in care and care leavers experience worse outcomes than their peers across a range of areas including loving relationships, health, education, employment and housing.



Our Promise: Home: Consultation



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Background

The Promise Ambassadors from across Cumbria for 2023 met on 12th April at Penrith Fire Station, 22 attended this meeting. The focus was on how young people can be supported in their experience of HOME, 1 of the 5 elements that makes Up Our Promise. They completed activities to find out what every HOME needs and what people supporting young people can do to support young people before during and after moving to a new home.

Our Promise: Home: Consultation

This activity was continued at the Cumbria CiCC: Activity Day: let's talk HOME, where 57 care experienced young people from across Cumbria came together to explore through opportunities designed to enable engagement, participation, and a dialogue around their experiences of feeling happy, safe and supported at HOME. Each group was supported and encouraged by adults in their groups to answer questions beyond yes and no, the format they were delivered in allowed this to happen. The activities included canoe raft, archery, enjoy a photo booth, and craft area and snakes and ladders. There was also the opportunity for all participants to help develop this years CiCC Celebrating Us awards by helping to design the day from the types of awards to the fun activities on offer.

Results

The Promise Ambassadors were invited to a virtual meeting on 24th May to go over the results from the HOME activities, they were challenged to think about what the results told them as well digesting and figuring out what they could do about what they have heard. The actions described below are all currently live and in the early stage of being developed and will continue to grow and change as they are developed further.

- My Family Leaflet: The majority of young people who attended the CiCC activity Day had not seen or knew what the My Family booklet was, the Promise
 Ambassadors would like to know if Social Workers are using it and if not why? They also wondered if the name could be changed to Our Home. Is there training
 around the use of this leaflet needed?
- · Create a top tip/advice sheet for foster carers and social workers on ways to support young people moving to a new home
- Create an advice sheet for young people moving to a new home or recently moved to one.
- · Create some short films that can be used about young people's experiences and to encourage people to find out more about fostering.

These actions were developed from the feedback from the events listed above, the Promise Ambassadors have used young people's voice to influence their actions. Please see below direct quotes from the activities.



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
